Friends of John Leigh Park sold refreshments, Peter hosted bowling, and George sold quality donated goods from a Table Top..




The Bollin Dancers gave us two sets of music and dancing from the generations. Their Dancing enthrals – and sucks you in if you dare to join in. Just lovely.

June, we are told, was the hottest month in the UK since records began. There were weeks with no rain, putting all of us and the plants and trees and grass in the park under pressure. It seems likely that this is the future we must be prepared for. Despite these difficulties, the park looks good thanks to the work of our gardening group and others, along with Amey and Trafford MBC. The most spectacular areas are the Ornamental Garden, Octagonal Bed and Dawn's Bank, but there are important additions elsewhere, including the Hydrangea bed just opposite the Acer bed at the north east corner beyond the bowling green.

Annual members please note, annual subscriptions are due in June each year. Thank you to all those who have paid up to June 2024, but we await payment from quite a few annual members.

We are feeling our way to improve the area on the east border beside the new wall of Townfield Gardens. At present this is an interesting mix of the fallen beech tree and plantings by serendipity – we have added mulch from autumn leaves.

The bowling green has suffered most from the heat and drought. Its problems are exacerbated by the fact that there is no water supply to the bowling hut (or pavilion). We are the only bowling facility in Trafford parks which is without water. This has been an inconvenience for the Ladies' Bowling team, for social bowlers and for all the weekly and extra events which we organised from the building. But now we feel there is an urgent need to establish a water supply to the bowling hut that can be used to water the green when there are periods of heat and drought. Despite the recognised need, The Council cannot fund the provision of piped water and drainage. We are in the process of obtaining a cost to run a pipe from the mess/toilet block to the bowling hut — looking to provide a standpipe as a first move which will be most affordable, but nevertheless quite expensive. We are engaged with Trafford MBC and Amey in this exercise. It will be necessary for us to raise funds via grants and any other means.

We do have excellent relations with the staff of Trafford MBC and Amey. Almost every month we are able to walk the park with their senior officers. This allows us to identify any new needs or ideas and agree how to make them good. Not every wish can be satisfied as quickly as we would wish, but we have to work within what is feasible,

The Toddlers' Play area – a colourful hut with a musical pipe-organ (which can be heard late into the evenings!). The play area for young people and older children, near Oldfield Road, has a new basket swing – less adventurous than its predecessor, but perhaps more durable, and a replacement see-saw. The see-saw is made of substances other than wood, which may mean it lasts longer, but pieces have already gone missing. These new pieces of equipment are well received by children, parents and young people.

We have been approached by West Timperley Medical Practice, asking that we publicise the Social Prescribing scheme available from them and other Practices – The aim is to improve people's health and well-being by involvement in supported activities - we and other agencies can help with this through offering placements as volunteers.
